WE'VE TURNED 10 YEARS OLD

On 7 March 2024, the RPR Coalition celebrated its tenth anniversary and summed up the achievements in promoting reforms in Ukraine.

During this time, we have contributed to the creation of the Public Broadcaster and a system of new anti-corruption bodies, achieved the e-declaration of officials (and in 2023 - the opening of access to the register of declarations) and the implementation of reforms in more than twenty areas.

Founded in the midst of the Revolution of Dignity in 2014, the Union has brought together more than 350 leading experts and nearly 70 civil society organizations over the past 10 years to develop and implement critical reforms for the country.

For a decade, the Coalition has been actively working on reforms in various areas, including the judiciary, anti-corruption, decentralization, public administration, and law enforcement agencies. Thanks to the joint efforts, more than 150 draft laws were developed and supported, many of which have already been adopted by the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine.

The celebration was an opportunity to discuss the achievements and challenges faced by civil society in the process of reforming the country. The event was attended by representatives of the diplomatic corps, including ambassadors, government officials, and a wide range of civil society. Among the honored guests and speakers were: **Oleksandr Kornienko**, First Deputy Chairman of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine; **Katarina Mathernova**, Ambassador of the European Union to Ukraine; **Ole Ekberg Mikkelsen**, Ambassador of Denmark to Ukraine; **Mike Hegarty**, 2nd Secretary of the British Embassy to Ukraine and others.

The event participants stressed the importance of further consolidating efforts to ensure sustainable development and democratic transformation in Ukraine.

RESULTS OF THE RPR COALITION'S WORK ADVOCACY DIRECTION

The RPR Coalition's task is to support and promote reforms and facilitate the consolidation of civil society in Ukraine. Advocacy for change is one mechanism for achieving this goal.

ADVOCACY OF DRAFT LAWS

Advocacy of the draft law No. 7283 “On Democracy at the Local Self-Government Level” (signed by the President) in partnership with UCIPR

Advocacy of the draft law №4254 “On public consultations” (signed by the President)

On February 28, Olga Lymar, Executive Director of the RPR Coalition, moderated an event of the National Democratic Institute (NDI) dedicated to the discussion of the draft law “On Public Consultations”. As a result of the event, it was agreed to further cooperate with the Deputy Chairman of the Parliament Oleksandr Korniyenko to find opportunities to adopt the draft law with the CSOs' recommendations. The RPR Coalition also supported the NDI in organizing an event with key MPs of all factions and the leadership of the Verkhovna Rada to discuss key positions on **the draft law “On Public Consultations” (May 1)**. The RPR Coalition continues to advocate for the inclusion of MPs as mandatory subjects of public consultations. Also, the importance of amending the Law of Ukraine “On Public Consultations” was emphasized during a closed event organized by the RPR Coalition with the participation of Oleksandr Korniyenko in December 2024. The RPR Coalition's advocacy department has developed the text of proposals for amending the Law “On Public Consultations”.

Advocacy of the draft law No. 6401 on amendments to the Law of Ukraine “On Local Self-Government in Ukraine” on ensuring transparency of local self-government (signed by the President) in partnership with UCIPR

Advocacy of the draft law №4380 “On administrative fee”

On June 17, a closed discussion of draft law No. 4380 “On Administrative Fee” with diplomats was held in Kyiv to draw the attention of

representatives of embassies and international organizations to the importance of this draft law for its further advocacy to preserve the achievements of the decentralization reform.

Advocacy of the draft law No. 4298 “On Amendments to the Law of Ukraine ‘On Local State Administrations’” (is in the Committee for the second reading)

In **December**, a closed discussion on the topic “Public Administration Reform as an Important Instrument for Ukraine's Integration into the EU” was held under the Chatham House rules with MPs, experts and diplomats. In a frank atmosphere, the participants discussed the current state of public administration reform, possible vectors of interaction between civil society and the government, as well as the experience of other countries in implementing civil service reform.

On August 13, the RPR Coalition in partnership with the CPLR organized a roundtable discussion “Oversight of the legality of local government decisions: best practices and prospects for legislative regulation in Ukraine”, in Kyiv. MPs (moderated by Vitalii Bezghin), representatives of the Ministry for Communities, Territories and Infrastructure Development of Ukraine (Deputy Minister Natalia Kozlovska), the CMU Secretariat, the Association of Local Self-Government (all four associations), the CBA, and the expert community discussed Ukrainian and foreign practices of oversight of local self-government and analyzed the draft law No. 4298.



The discussion continued with a roundtable discussion “Oversight of the legality of local government decisions: who should carry out and how” on **October 4** in Lviv. During the discussion, representatives of the Parliament noted that the draft law No. 4298 will be adopted in the first quarter of 2025.



Advocacy of a package of draft laws on jury trial (the Verkhovna Rada adopted draft laws No. 3843 and 3844 as a basis)

In **January 2024**, the RPR Coalition in partnership with the CPLR and the NDI held three online discussions (focus groups) on the topic: “Trial by Jury: Citizen Participation as a Mechanism for Increasing Trust in Justice”. The purpose of the events was to discuss with various stakeholder groups the prospects of introducing the jury system and to help find the best configuration that will function optimally in Ukraine and increase public access and trust in the judiciary.

On June 7, in Kyiv, the RPR Coalition and the CPLR held a roundtable discussion on “Trial by Jury: Citizen Participation as a Mechanism for Increasing Trust in Justice”.

During the event, an analytical report was presented - the result of a series of discussions held in January with a circle of experts directly involved in the formation of judicial policy.



As a result, the authors of the draft laws on the introduction of the classical jury trial model in Ukraine and the participants of the roundtable agreed to recommend draft laws No. 3843, 3844, 3845 for the first reading in the Parliament and to finalize them for the second reading. It should be added that in early December, these draft laws (Nos. 3843 and 3844) were adopted as a basis and are currently being prepared for the second reading.

Implementation of magistrate justice in Ukraine

On July 22, 23 and August 27, the RPR Coalition in partnership with the CPLR and the Legal Development Network NGO held three online expert discussions aimed at finding the best model of the institution of magistrates in Ukraine. The discussions involved a wide range of stakeholders, including legal practitioners, academics, and community representatives.

The discussions resulted in the development of an analytical report and its presentation to further advocate for the introduction of magistrates' justice as one of the most important tools in building democratic institutions.

On September 12, in Kyiv, the RPR Coalition in partnership with the Center of Policy and Legal Reform and the Legal Development Network NGO held a roundtable discussion on “The Institute of Magistrates as a Tool for Involving Communities in the Judiciary”. During the roundtable, a report prepared on the basis of three previous discussions with the participation of judges, lawyers, academics, representatives of government agencies, communities and associations of local governments, and experts from NGOs was presented. Following the discussion, the participants agreed that the classical format of the institute of magistrates is needed in Ukraine. The participants also agreed to continue the discussion on the configuration of the elements of the institute of magistrates.

Advocating for the need to reform legal education (the working group on legal education reform approved the concept of the draft Law of Ukraine “On Higher Legal Education and Initial Access to the Legal Profession”)

At the end of **April**, the RPR Coalition in partnership with the DEJURE Foundation organized and held a series of three discussions with a range of experts directly involved in the legal education system in Ukraine: representatives of relevant ministries and other government agencies, representatives of the academic and legal communities, and experts from NGOs. The results of these discussions were used to prepare an analytical report, which was presented on August 30 during a roundtable discussion entitled “Reform of Higher Legal Education in Ukraine: Approaches to Distinguishing between Legal Education and Training of Law Enforcement Specialists”. The event was organized by the RPR Coalition in partnership with the DEJURE Foundation and the USAID Justice for All Program with the support of USAID/NDI.

The participants of the event agreed on the necessity of demarcation and discussed further advocacy steps. Representatives of the President's Office also noted that a presidential decree on the topic of discussion was being prepared. In addition, the need to reform legal education is also mentioned in the Rule of Law Roadmap.

Preparing amendments to the Law “On Associations of Local Self-Government Bodies” and launching the process of coordinating the text of amendments to the legislation with the leadership of all-Ukrainian associations of local self-government bodies and specialized experts.

On September 26, a presentation of the results of the study of the activities of local government associations was held in Kyiv. The Reanimation Package of Reforms Coalition will use the results of the study to improve the legislation on local government associations and promote further institutionalization of the local government system in Ukraine.



On November 21 and December 13, the RPR Coalition, together with the CPLR, within the framework of the USAID/HOVERLA project, held two closed discussions of the draft law aimed at updating the Law of Ukraine “On Associations of Local Self-Government Bodies” with representatives of the Ukrainian Association of Rayon and Oblast Councils and the Association of Ukrainian Cities. Following the meetings, it was agreed to continue working together to develop proposals for the draft law.

Preparation of Amendments to the Law of Ukraine “On Fair Lobbying”

On February 8, with the support of the NDI, the RPR Coalition held a closed meeting with civil society experts, diplomats and representatives of international organizations to discuss the draft law “On Fair Lobbying” in order to neutralize the risks for civil society organizations laid down in the draft law. The final text of the law partially achieved positive changes.

ADVOCACY AREAS

UKRAINE RECOVERY CONFERENCE

Ukraine remains in the spotlight of international politics, which creates new opportunities for strengthening our cooperation with international partners. In June 2024, representatives of our organization, including Executive Director Olga Lymar, Yuriy Mykytiuk, and Co-Chairs of the RPR Coalition Board Yulia Kyrychenko and Ihor Burakovsky, took part in the Ukraine Recovery Conference 2024 in Berlin. The results of the event, prepared by Olga Lymar and Yuriy Mykytiuk, were published in the New Eastern Europe publication, which helped to spread the key messages in the international arena.



UKRAINE'S INTEGRATION INTO THE EU

In 2024, in the context of European Integration processes, our organization stepped up its participation in international events aimed at Ukraine's integration into the European Union. This allowed us to strengthen our advocacy position and facilitate a constructive dialogue between Ukrainian civil society, government officials, and international partners.

On 23 June 2022, the European Council granted Ukraine the status of a candidate for accession to the European Union. On 14 December 2023, the European Council decided to start negotiations on Ukraine's accession to the European Union, and on 25 June 2024, the start of negotiations was officially announced. Therefore, the issue of European Integration processes has been and remains one of the most pressing in Ukraine.

The RPR Coalition assisted in **the development of roadmaps for the fundamental cluster (EU Integration) and participation in the negotiation groups**. In the summer of 2024, in Kyiv, Executive Director Olga Lymar, Head of Regional Programmes, Deputy Head of Advocacy and International Relations Yurii Mykytiuk, and Advocacy manager Viktoria Didach joined consultations with members of the official Ukrainian delegation to the EU, representatives of ministries and agencies and NGOs. In total, representatives of the RPR Coalition team joined three such events.

The subject of discussion was the preparation of the Rule of Law Roadmap. During the meeting, the general framework and draft structure of the Rule of Law Roadmap were presented under the negotiating subchapters 23 "Judiciary and Fundamental Rights" and 24 "Justice, Freedom and Security". The RPR Coalition submitted proposals to the Roadmap. In addition, representatives of the Coalition joined the working (negotiation) groups. The following events were also held


The forum "Through Reforms to the Stars" was organized by the CPLR together with the RPR Coalition in partnership with Democracy Reporting International (DRI) on **22 May 2024**. Among the honored invited guests were the EU Ambassador Katarina Mathernova and the Speaker of the Parliament, Ruslan Stefanchuk. Olha Stefanishyna, Deputy Prime Minister for European and Euro-Atlantic Integration of Ukraine, also spoke at one of the panels. The participants discussed the negotiation process with the EU and the explanation of the fundamental cluster of the negotiation framework. Experts presented recommendations on different areas of the pillar, namely the rule of law and democratic institutions, good governance, and a capable economy



The CPLR, in partnership with the RPR Coalition, held a roundtable discussion on **21 November** in Kyiv on the topic **"Participation of civil society organizations in the negotiation process on Ukraine's accession to the EU: existing models and experience of other candidate countries."**



On **26 November** in Kyiv, the Ukrainian Centre for European Policy, CPLR, and the RPR Coalition held a public discussion on the topic **"Fundamentals for successful accession negotiations with the EU."** The discussion focused on the practical experience of other EU candidate countries in conducting accession negotiations, how to build an effective and efficient negotiation structure, and how to involve representatives of civil society in this process.



On 5 December in Kyiv, the RPR Coalition and the Centre of Policy and Legal Reform held a discussion on **"Key Issues of Ukraine's European Integration"**. The event included:

- a public discussion, Key priorities ahead of the preparation of screening reports on fundamental issues", followed by
- a closed discussion (according to the Chatham House rules) "Public Administration Reform as an Important Instrument for Ukraine's Integration into the EU". In a frank atmosphere, the current state of public administration reform, possible vectors of interaction between civil society and the government, and the experience of other countries in implementing public administration reform were discussed.



SUSTAINABILITY OF DEMOCRACY

On 13 May, the RPR Coalition, with the support of DRI, held a press conference "Resilience of Key State Authorities and Democracy in Times of War: the View of Civil Society Representatives" at Ukrinform. The event was dedicated to the legitimacy of the authorities and elections during the war.



On 1 November, in Kyiv, the RPR Coalition, with the support of the CPLR and DRI, organized the annual Forum "Democracy During the War: Ukraine's Experience and Lessons for the World". The Forum is a platform for dialogue between Ukrainian and international statesmen, politicians, academics and researchers of the socio-political system, historians and civil society activists, military personnel, and volunteers on the transformation of Ukrainian democracy and society, the consequences of such changes for the national, European and international political order, and the fate of democracy in the future.



Before the panel discussions began, former President of Ukraine (2005-2010) Viktor Yushchenko delivered a speech at the Forum. Other speakers at the Forum included Oleksandr Korniyenko, First Deputy Chairman of the Verkhovna Rada of Ukraine; Olha Stefanishyna, Deputy Prime Minister for European and Euro-Atlantic Integration of Ukraine; Katarina Mathernova, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the European Union to Ukraine; Martin Jäger, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Federal Republic of Germany to Ukraine; Pat Cox, former President of the European Parliament; Timothy Garton Ash, historian, author and Professor of European Studies at the University of Oxford; Olexandra Matviichuk, Head of the Center for Civil Liberties (the first Ukrainian organization to receive the Nobel Peace Prize) and other prominent figures from Ukraine and the world, including Ukrainian writers, military officers, philosophers and experts on socio-political issues.

On 26 November, in Berlin, experts of the RPR Coalition, together with representatives of the authorities and the media, took part in a public discussion "Democracy in War: Resilience and Future of Ukraine's Democratic Institutions" and analyzed what ensures stability and development of democracies in the midst of a crisis.



STRATEGIC VISION AND RECOVERY

On 28 February, a meeting on higher education reform was held with Minister of Education and Science Oksen Lisoviy, Deputy Minister Mykhailo Vynnytskyi, MP Roman Hryshchuk, Executive Director of the RPR Coalition Olga Lyman, Professor Yevhen Bystrytskyi and other civil society experts. The meeting was held on the basis of the policy document Vision of Ukraine 2030: Social and Humanitarian Sphere. It was agreed to cooperate, to involve the public in the development and discussion of legislative changes and to develop a common vision and promote the reform.

On 3 June, a closed discussion was held in Kyiv in an "off-the-record" format on the topic "Social networks and national security of Ukraine: conditions of interaction, efficiency improvement, and permissible restrictions." The event resulted in a consensus on the importance of the subject matter and further steps to address the problem.

On 24 October, in Riga, Olga Lyman, the Executive Director of the RPR Coalition, took part in the Second HROMADA Conference "Strengthening Ukraine: Sharing Knowledge for a Sustainable Future". The conference was organized by the Faculty of Economics and Social Sciences of the University of Latvia in cooperation with the HROMADA network, which aims to support the reconstruction of Ukraine. The participants discussed the challenges and prospects of Ukraine's European integration, the life of Ukrainian refugees in the Nordic and Baltic countries, and how to help improve education and mental health in Ukraine during the war.

NATIONAL MEMORY

A roundtable discussion on the challenges of the European policy of remembrance of the Second World War. On **8 May**, in partnership and on the initiative of the Centre for Research of Liberation Movement, a large-scale roundtable of Ukrainian historians, politicians, and intellectuals was held on the topic "Never Again? Challenges of the European Policy of Memory of the Second World War in the Context of the Russian-Ukrainian War". The RPR Coalition was represented by Yaryna Yasynevych, a member of the RPR Coalition Board, who outlined the "status quo" of memory policy in the West in her speech.

Olga Lymar became a speaker at the online course of the National Agency for the Prevention of Corruption specifically for the heads of public sector organizations, employees, and ordinary citizens who want to learn how to interact effectively with the authorities, business, and society in general. The Executive Director shared the advocacy experience of the RPR Coalition and spoke about the main areas of cooperation, including the period of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, and what tools of interaction the state can introduce to make cooperation with civil society representatives more effective.

LVIV

Launch of the author's certified video course "Regulatory Policy at the Local Level" on the educational online platform Zrozumilo

The aim of the course is to help all those interested in learning the key stages of regulation and to demonstrate how important regulatory instruments are for local economic development. In addition, we wanted to convey to the audience that knowledge of the regulatory procedure is important not only for civil servants, but also for representatives of business, the public sector, and even educators.

Implementation of the project on regulatory instruments for economic recovery

The goal of this project is to facilitate a transparent and effective economic recovery process in Ukraine through a set of regulatory and anti-corruption measures. Five model regulatory acts were developed for five sectors of economic activity to help local governments minimize mistakes, reduce administrative burdens, and ensure fair business rules of the game.

RIVNE

Participation in the development and advocacy of Law No. 3703-IX - "On Amendments to Certain Laws of Ukraine on Democracy at the Local Government Level"

In November 2024, Ukrainian civil society organizations called on the President to sign the Law. OPORA also joined the initiative. In addition, experts of the Civil Network joined the working group under the parliamentary committee to develop the Draft law.

Participation in the preparation and advocacy for the adoption of a new charter in the Rivne community

Representatives of civil society and the authorities have been working on this document for a long time. Rivne's previous charter dates back to 2008. Andrii Tokarskyi, the head of Rivne OPORA, was one of those who worked on the new charter.

KORSUN-SHEVCHENKIVSKYI

Implementation of the project "Advocacy of Local IDP Policies"

The project established local initiative groups of IDP women. These groups received training through educational events and mentoring support to implement advocacy initiatives.

A sociological survey of regional representatives of CSOs and local authorities was conducted

An analysis of tools/mechanisms for involving residents in decision-making on the recovery of territorial communities was conducted, opportunities and barriers for civil society representatives were identified, and recommendations for strengthening public participation in the recovery process were proposed. Specific recommendations were formulated to improve the tools for engaging citizens in the recovery process.

A subdivision of the NGO "Against Corruption" - the Public Recovery Office in Mykolaiv region - was established

COALITION "ON THE CONTACT LINE" (DONETSK AND LUHANSK REGIONS)

The Coalition "On the Contact Line" held a roundtable discussion with representatives of the Government

The topic of the meeting: "Vision of Donetsk and Luhansk regions under uncertainty: human capital, identity, reintegration, recovery". The analytical work of the Coalition was presented and further ways of advocacy on the key priorities of the NHL were discussed.

Strengthening the institutional and organizational component of the Coalition "On the Contact Line"

The Charter and the Council of the Union were updated, an internal advocacy policy was prepared, and the Strategy and Organisational Development Plan until 2026 was created and approved.

SUMY

About 300 participants took part in 15 of our events, ranging from mine safety to countering PSYOPs

We held about 20 meetings with concerned Sumy residents on various projects and ideas that could be implemented in Sumy. We sent up to 10 appeals to the city council and the executive authority regarding important changes in the city.

Promoted advocacy changes: from amending the city charter to participating in the process of decolonizing the place names in Sumy (depriving streets and squares of imperial and Soviet names). Organized 5 information campaigns for Sumy residents (from explaining the skills of civilians to the topic "Why Soviet names in the city are not ok").

Participation in the discussion of strategic development projects in Mykolaiv

Provision of humanitarian aid to representatives of communities in the Mykolaiv region

Advocacy of the City Council's decisions launching the reform of municipal enterprises management in Mykolaiv

Participation in the first international conference "Mykolaiv - the City on the Wave"

The event brought together experts in urban planning, innovation, and sustainable development to discuss the prospects for reconstructing and transforming Mykolaiv. This conference has become an important platform for establishing partnerships with international organizations, business representatives, and non-governmental initiatives.


